

STUDENTS RESEARCH VAPING IN PREPARATION FOR ANNENBERG SCIENCE SYMPOSIUM





In preparation for their presentation at the **UDHS** Annenberg Science Symposium, students examined the lungs of a fetal pig as part of their study on how vaping affects the lungs. UDHS Anatomy teacher Theresa Diamond gave an informative lecture about the form and function of the lungs and then facilitated the students' lab work. Kindergarten teacher Geri Sullivan later met with students to discuss the serious consequences her son experienced as a result of his vaping. Mrs. Sullivan willingly shared the details of her son's diagnosis, his treatment and his recovery from vaping illness, as well as her concerns about vaping companies targeting teens.
