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Philosophy

Consistent with Upper Darby School District Goals, the goal of Upper Darby High School's Code of Conduct is to instill in each student an awareness of and respect for the rights of other students, parents and staff. Such awareness shall include proper respect of constituted authority, conformity to school rules and regulations, and such provisions of the law as shall apply to student conduct.

Citizenship in a democracy requires respect for the rights of others. Student conduct shall reflect consideration for the rights and privileges of others and shall exhibit cooperation with all members of the school community. High personal standards of courtesy, decency, morality, clean language, honesty and wholesome relationships with others shall be encouraged. Respect for real and personal property, pride in work, and achievement consistent with one's ability shall be expected of all students.

Student Rights

Resident students have the right to a free, appropriate public education until age 21 or graduation from Upper Darby High School, whichever occurs first. In cases where discipline is being considered, each student will have a fair chance to have his/her side of a controversy considered. The Upper Darby School District does not discriminate against any student on the basis of race, creed, handicap, nationality, or sex. If there are any concerns regarding such matters, they should be referred to the student's teacher or guidance counselor. If the concern cannot be resolved at this level, the building administration can be asked to participate in resolving the problem. In line with the school district organization, the Superintendent can be involved in any matter not resolved at the building level. This Code of Conduct has been prepared in accordance with Local, State and Federal laws, which define student rights and specify the need for a comprehensive discipline policy. Special Education students are subject to all parts of the Code of Conduct. The District complies with all aspects of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and the Pennsylvania Department of Education Special Education Regulations.

Responsibilities of the Student

Student responsibilities include regular school attendance, conscientious effort in classroom work, and conformance to school rules and regulations. Most of all, students share with the administration and faculty a responsibility to develop a climate within the school that is conducive to wholesome learning and living. No student has the right to interfere with the education of his fellow students. It is the responsibility of each student to respect the rights of teachers, administrators, fellow students and all others who are involved in the educational process. Students should express their ideas and opinions in a respectful manner. It is the responsibility of each student to conform to the following:

- Be aware of all rules and regulations for student behavior and conduct one's self in accordance with them. The student should assume that, until a rule is waived, altered or repealed in writing, it is in effect.
- Be aware of and utilize digital resources such as the Student Access Center and Schoology to obtain and complete school work in the event of an absence.
- Volunteer information in matters relating to the health, safety, and welfare of the school community and the protection of school property.
- Dress and groom to meet fair standards of safety and health, and not to cause substantial disruption to the educational processes.
- Assist the school staff in operating a safe school for all students, staff, and visitors.
- Comply with Commonwealth and local laws.
- Exercise proper care when using public facilities and equipment.
- Attend school daily and be on time at all classes and other school functions.
- Make up work for absences from school.
- Pursue and attempt to complete satisfactorily the courses of study prescribed by Commonwealth and local school authorities.
- Exhibit courtesy and abstain from the use of indecent or obscene language.

Responsibilities of the Parent

- To assist a student's compliance with Upper Darby High School's Code of Conduct, it is recommended that parents:
- Explain the school rules to their children
- Become involved in all aspects of the student's school life.
- Take an interest in the courses taken, the texts and materials used, the lessons studied, the homework assigned, the rosters, and the results of standardized and teacher constructed tests.
- Maintain contact with the school.
- Monitor student employment hours and practices to ensure maximum academic performance.
- Encourage participation in a wide range of school activities

Responsibilities of the Faculty

Since the faculty has the primary contact with the student body, enforcement of the discipline policy rests principally with the staff. All High School Personnel have the obligation to:

- Build relationships with students and create a safe learning environment.
- Familiarize them with the Code of Conduct, including the positive interventions and proactive steps to take to avoid and minimize negative behavior or reactions.
- Become involved in all aspects of the student's school life.
- Encourage student participation in all facets of school life.
- Enforce the discipline policy consistently, regardless of any personal philosophical disagreements with it.
- Comply with related procedures as detailed in the Upper Darby High School Faculty Handbook.
- Maintain a record of all violations that occur under their purview.
- Work with other colleagues and ask for assistance with students when struggling to connect with.

Definitions

- Academic Penalties Grade reduction or denial of opportunities to turn in work, take tests, etc.
- Alternative Education for Disruptive Youth This program is highly structured and may be considered as a preventive placement to expulsion. Students receive computer-based instruction supplemented with written assignments in Math, English, Social Studies, and Science. Students also learn goal-setting, social skills, and study skills.
- Bodily Injury Impairment of physical condition or substantial pain.
- Serious Bodily Injury Bodily injury which creates a substantial risk of death, or which causes serious, permanent disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ.
- Confiscation Temporary or permanent seizure of prohibited items in a student's possession.
- Course of Conduct A pattern of actions composed of more than one act over a period of time, however short, evidencing a continuity of conduct.
- Deadly Weapon Any firearm, whether loaded or unloaded, or any device designed as a weapon and capable of producing death or serious bodily injury, or any other device or instrumentality which, in the manner in which it is used or intended to be used, is calculated or likely to produce death or serious bodily injury.
- Denial of Privileges Students are prohibited from attending or participating in designated activities either curricular or extracurricular.

- *Detention* Students must be in attendance at a particular time and place for a specified amount of time, under the supervision of a school staff member. Students must be given twenty-four (24) hours notice.
 - Unless specifically notified otherwise, detention is to be held in the assigning teacher's classroom beginning promptly at 2:46 p.m. and ending at 3:01 p.m. Students who are late will not be admitted to detention. This will be considered a detention cut.
 - Detention Rules:
 - Students are not permitted to speak or communicate with each other.
 - Students must bring something to do; i.e., homework, books or magazines to read.
- *Disciplinary Conference* A conference with the student's Assistant Principal or Lead Teacher to address a failure to comply with the Code of Conduct.
- Emotional Distress A temporary or permanent state of mental anguish.
- *Expulsion* Exclusion from school for a period in excess of ten (10) days to permanent. Students who are expelled are not permitted in any school building or on school grounds and may not attend or participate in any school activity. Expulsion may be imposed only by the Board of School Directors after required due process proceedings.
- *Gang* any ongoing organization or group of people which has an identifiable name or identifying sign or symbol or whose members individually or collectively engage in or have engaged in a pattern of activity that endangers or disrupts the safety of the school or members of the school community.
- Lunch Detention- Lunch Detention will occur during the student's assigned lunch period in a designated Lunch Detention Classroom. All students must arrive on time at that location. The teachers monitoring the room will communicate with cafeteria supervisors to supply lunch at their convenience. Expectations of student behavior in accordance with detention.
- Out-of-School Suspension Parents will be notified of the reason for and the length of the suspension. In addition, the student and his/her parents have the right to an informal hearing when a suspension of four (4) or more days is imposed. The school may require a parent conference precedent to readmission from any suspension.
- *Parent Contact* Communication with the parent, either by phone, letter, or conference, concerning a student's behavior and the consequence of the behavior
- Parent Means the natural parent, guardian, or other adults responsible for the student.
- *Public* As used in the section covering "Disorderly Conduct", public means affecting or likely to affect persons in a place to which the public or a substantial group has access. This includes schools.
- Pupil A person between the ages of 6 and 21 years who are enrolled in school.
- *Referral for Counseling* The student must participate in counseling from his/her guidance counselor, school social worker, or an outside agency counselor approved through the Office of Pupil Personnel Services.

- *Restorative* The approach to resolving conflict and repairing harm by enabling those who have been harmed to convey the impact of the harm to those responsible, and for those responsible to acknowledge this impact and take steps to put it right.
- Saturday School Unless specifically notified otherwise, Saturday School will be held on every Saturday during the school year that is not a holiday weekend. A holiday is any weekend in which a holiday falls on a Friday, Saturday, Sunday, or Monday. Saturday School will be held in the Upper Darby High School Cafeteria. Students must do school work, research or appropriate reading, and participate in the restorative activity provided. Saturday School will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and students must present their ID in order to be admitted. In order to be excused from Saturday School, a doctor's note or administration approval is required upon return to school.
- School A school operated by a joint board of directors or school board where pupils are enrolled in compliance with the Public School Code of 1949, including area vocational schools and intermediate units.
- School Service A voluntary service that is approved by the school administration that a student can perform to have five demerits deducted from the student's school record.
- Serious Provocation Conduct sufficient to excite an intense passion in a reasonable person.
- *Special Assignment* Assignment of a task by a school staff member. The task must be explained to the student and a time frame specified.
- Tier II- Specific level of an intervention designed to address targeted student behavior.
- Tobacco A lighted or unlighted cigarette, cigar, pipe or other lighted smoking product and smokeless tobacco in any form.
- *Verbal Reprimand* A verbal warning issued by a school staff member that a student's behavior is inappropriate and must be modified.
- *Victim* Any person against whom any crime as defined under the laws of the state is being or has been perpetrated or attempted.
- *Withdrawal from Class* Removal from class on a permanent basis with a grade of failing (WF) and placed into a study hall. The course cannot be made up during Summer School.
- *Witness* Any person having knowledge of the existence or non-existence of facts or information relating to any crime.

Definitions of Specific Offenses

- Criminal Mischief A person is guilty of criminal mischief if he/she:
 - Damages tangible property of another intentionally, recklessly or by negligence.
- *Disorderly Conduct* A person is guilty of disorderly conduct if, with intent to cause public inconvenience, annoyance or alarm, or recklessly creating a risk thereof, they:
 - Engage in fighting or threatening or violent tumultuous behavior.
 - Make unreasonable noise.
 - Use obscene language, or makes an obscene gesture.
 - Create a hazardous or physically offensive condition by any act which serves no legitimate purpose.
- *Harassment* A person commits the crime of harassment by communication or address when with intent to harass, annoy or alarm another.
 - $\circ~$ An intent to place such person in reasonable fear of bodily injury.
 - An intent to cause substantial emotional distress to another person.
- Open Lewdness A person commits a misdemeanor of the third degree if he/she does any lewd act which he/she knows is likely to be observed by others would be affronted or alarmed.
- Simple Assault A person is guilty of assault if he/she:
 - Attempts to cause or intentionally, knowingly or recklessly causes bodily injury to another.
 - Negligently causes bodily injury to another with a deadly weapon.
 - Attempts by physical menace to put another in fear of imminent serious bodily injury.
- *Theft By Unlawful Taking* A person is guilty of theft if he/she unlawfully takes, or exercises unlawful control over, the property of another with intent to deprive him/her thereof.
- Use of Tobacco In Schools Prohibited A person who possesses or uses tobacco in a school building, a school bus or on school property under the control of a school district commits a summary offense.

Searches

School authorities may search the person, the possessions of, and/or the locker assigned to any student. School authorities may take temporary possession of and safeguard any materials, which are considered to be evidence of the commission of an offense or of other improper activity.

In general, searches should be based on reasonable suspicion that material will be produced, which evidences the violation of the Upper Darby High School Code of Conduct and/or a violation of applicable law, statute, or regulation. Prior

to an individual locker search, the student shall be notified and be given an opportunity to be present. However, when school authorities have a reasonable suspicion that a locker contains materials that pose a threat to the health, welfare or safety of the school population, student lockers may be searched without prior warning.

Custody and control of student lockers are shared jointly by the Upper Darby High School and the assigned student(s). Although students have a legitimate expectation of privacy in a school locker, the expectation should be minimal. Under certain circumstances, the interests of the Upper Darby School District to search a locker or lockers will clearly outweigh the intrusion into the privacy rights of students.

Deterring drug possession and use is a compelling concern for school officials. Appropriate searches are permissible to both discover the evidence of drugs within the school and to warn students that bringing drugs to school will not be tolerated. Canine sniff searches will be used to minimize the intrusiveness of any mass or school-wide search.

Physical Restraint

Physical restraint may be used for, but not limited to, the following reasons: defense of self or others, removal of students from the educational setting, or detaining a student while awaiting the arrival of school administrators or police.

Staff members may use reasonable force as is necessary to protect themselves from attack, protect another person or property, quell a disturbance threatening physical injury to others, and/or obtain possession of dangerous objects.

Demerits

A demerit is a mark made against a student's record for failure to comply with the Code of Conduct. *Demerits will be assigned along with other disciplinary consequences in the following manner:*

Combined Incidents – 1 demerit Lunch Detention – 1 demerit Disciplinary Conference – 1 demerit Community Service - 2 demerits Saturday School – 3 demerits per Saturday Out-of-School Suspension – 5 demerits per day Students who accumulate an excessive number of demerits during the academic year will lose the privilege of participating in any extracurricular activities as follows:

15 demerits = Loss of privileges/event participation for all of Marking Period 1 (ending on 10/31/19) 30 demerits = Loss of privileges/event participation for all of Marking Period 2 (ending on 1/17/20) 45 demerits = Loss of privileges/event participation for all of Marking Period 3 (ending on 3/27/20 60 demerits = Loss of privileges/event participation for all of Marking Period 4 (ending on 6/9/20)

At each demerit threshold, additional supports will be considered (ex. SAP referral, SST consideration, AEDY placement). In addition, students who hit threshold numbers will be notified on a weekly basis, via US Mail and Parent Link, until the demerit reduction falls below the threshold number.

Privilege/Event participation includes, but is not limited to the following:

- Vocal and instrumental music program rehearsals and performances
- Play and musical rehearsals and performances
- Student Government
- Media center and tech crew
- Club meetings or other activities
- Field trips
- Homecoming (participant/spectator)
- Powder Puff (participant/spectator)
- Fashion Show (participant/spectator)
- UD's Got Talent (participant/spectator)
- Proms and Class dances
- Senior Appreciation Day
- Mr. Upper Darby(participant/spectator)
- Movie Night (participant/spectator)
- Any other school-related function

Students who pay for an extracurricular activity (dance ticket, field trip payment, etc.) are not guaranteed a refund if they are later deemed ineligible, as the school is often required to pay for each student's involvement in such activities well in advance of the actual event. Athletic team practices, games, and any other organized team activities will fall under the

athletic program regulations. Any student who participates in Royal Recovery may be eligible for participation in an above event. See below.

Demerit Reduction

Royal Recovery

Students can remove demerits from their total by filling out a Royal Recovery Sheet. Royal Recovery sheets are available from lead teachers, counselors, and administrators. If a student completes 5 consecutive days following the guidelines of the program they can reduce their demerit total by 5.

School Service

Students also have the option to participate in a *School Service* activity, which is defined as a voluntary service that is approved by the school personnel that a student can perform to have demerits deducted from the student's school record. The reduction will occur based on hours of service. For example, if a student participates in 2 hours of school beautification, he or she will reduce their demerits by 2. The maximum amount of hours a student can total in a week is 5. Students have the ability to reduce their demerits by no more than 10 demerits in a one-week time frame.

Tier II

As part of our PBIS framework, UDHS provides interventions for students not responding positively to the universal rules and school procedures. Students demonstrating the need for additional behavioral support may be referred to the Tier II team. The procedures are as follows:

Tier II Flow Chart

Tier I Code of Conduct Violations – Behaviors that impede the orderly classroom procedures which include but are not limited to the below examples: These behaviors can usually be addressed by an individual teacher but sometimes may require intervention on the part of a school administrator by assigning the appropriate disposition.

We strongly encourage students to exhibit their school by wearing school colors and apparel.

- Students are not permitted to wear apparel that belittles another, suggests a sexual activity, or refers to violence, weapons, alcohol, drugs, tobacco, discrimination, gangs, or any illegal activity. Objectionable language or graphics are also not permitted on apparel or belongings.
- All shirts and dresses must have sleeves and cover the entire torso, and shoulders. Tank tops, midriffs, tube tops, low cut shirts, strapless, spaghetti straps, see-through shirts, halters, or bareback shirts are not permitted.
- Dresses, skirts, and shorts must reach mid-thigh. We use the "fingertip" rule, which means when standing straight, the fingertips are in line with the hem.
- Pants must be worn above the hip bone. No undergarments are to be seen at any time. Tights worn as pants are not permitted.
- See-through clothing, undergarments worn as outer garments, and sleepwear are not permitted.
- Clothing that is torn or ripped is not permitted.

Document the intervention in Teacher Access Center.

Sample Restorative Interventions:

- 1) Restorative conference w/ student
- 2) Reward Alternative Behavior
- 3) Restitution to the affected
- 4) Reflection paragraph
- 5) Written apology
- 6) A brief conversation in the hall making an agreement to defuse and move on
- Ask the student his/her opinion on how to fix the harm, encourage follow-through

Step 4 - Issue a teacher detention. Document all previous interventions and parent contact, including dates and times.

Step 5 - If the behavior continues, submit a Tier II referral.

- Dress Code Violations

Virtual Addendum (added, August 2020)

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Upper Darby High School Code of Conduct has been modified to reflect the virtual learning environment. Please see below.

Dispositions/Interventions

No "in-person" dispositions, such as teacher detention, lunch detention, Saturday School, or Community Service will be held. Restorative consequences may be held virtually, except for lunch detention. These include, but are not limited to: Parent/teacher conferences, student/teacher conferences, restorative conferences or a referral to youth court.

<u>Tier II</u>

Tier II supports will remain in place throughout the 20-21 school year in all settings (ex. virtual, hybrid, brick and mortar). Referrals to Tier II will be determined through a review of infractions and accumulation of demerits while in the virtual setting. Students may also be referred to Tier II by grade level center staff based upon academic concerns, attendance, and behavior.

Tier III/Tier IV Infractions

Any student that commits Tier III or IV violations will be automatically considered for a SAP or Tier II referral, parent contact, and other restorative practices. Additional or egregious Tier III/IV infractions could result in further disciplinary consequences pending administrative review.

Upper Darby High School Norms for Virtual Instruction Be "SMART"

- 1. Be mindful of your **Surroundings**. Find a private place with an appropriate background in your home for logging into synchronous instruction.
- 2. Use the **Mute** feature when necessary. Be mindful that there are other students in your class that may be distracted if you are not on Mute.
- 3. Everything you say and type must be school **Appropriate**.
- 4. Follow teachers' procedures for **Responding** to questions and sharing out loud during virtual class time.
- 5. Log in "on **Time**" for each class.
