

Tonight, I want to take a moment to thank three members of our Board of School Directors for their service, dedication and participation in the District for several decades. Ms. Judy Gentile has been a parent, a teacher, a member of the board for our local library, a staunch supporter of the history of Collen Brook Farm, and a Board of School Director. Dr. Ken Rucci, who is unfortunately out of town for business and unable to attend this evening, has also been an active home and school member, booster club supporter, and Board of School Director. Ms. Lee Jordan has also been a supporter of our home and school association, booster clubs, and a Board of School Director. Dr. Rucci and Ms. Jordan are also proud, very proud Upper Darby

graduates. Ms. Gentile, Dr. Rucci, and Ms. Jordan I want to say thank you for your decades of service to this community. We have been blessed that this Board of School Directors and team has continued to put the focus on the needs of the children we serve and the entire community we serve. Ms. Gentile, Dr. Rucci, and Ms. Jordan thank you for your hours of volunteerism commitment to the continuous improvement of our schools and community.

Congratulations to Ms. Curry, Mr. Fields, Ms. Hegg, Mr. Warsavage, and Mr. Neil on being reelected and elected to serve on the Board of School Directors for the Upper Darby School District. We look forward to working with all of you. We are a team and will continue our relentless pursuit of providing meaningful and equitable opportunities to our students on our path toward reaching excellence.

Members of the Board and community this past October the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania completed its work on the start times for secondary schools. The title of the report is called Sleep Deprivation in Adolescents: The Case For Delaying Secondary School Start Times. I have read the study and it has been posted on our District website for your review. I have asked Assistant Superintendent Ed Marshaleck to provide several options and estimated costs if the District were to change the start of our school day for our secondary schools. It is our plan to present options on meeting the recommendations of the sleep study report and allow the public to provide feedback prior to any final decision. We hope to have preliminary findings and options for the Education and Pupil Services Committee meeting in January. This report has garnered a lot of attention in the county, and we will also share how other districts are addressing the information from the report.

Along with the news of the recently released sleep study, I had promised the Board and the public and update on the recent Superintendents Retreat hosted by the DCIU in Washington, DC. It was really an enjoyable experience. I had the opportunity to meet with Superintendents from the county. We were fortunate to have partnered with George Washington University who led a panel discussion with us on "Leading Teaching for Equity" and a discussion on social justice in public education. The discussions and case study really highlighted the work that we have already started here in Upper Darby. I know we still have work to do, but it was very encouraging to know that we are heading in the right direction.

Each month, Dr. Council, Mr. Marshaleck, and I attend Penn Study Council hosted by Dr. Harris Sokoloff. Each month, we discuss research and best practices in education and business with Superintendents from Delaware, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. This year, we are all working on "Rethinking the K-12 experience for children and teachers." We have reviewed what the anticipated job market will look like 10 years from now, and how future trends in business and education impact the social and emotional needs of the students and staff we work with each day. We have been asked during our work with the Penn Study Council this year to think about a "Portrait of a Graduate... and the necessary skills a 2032 high school graduate should learn and possess... "(PENNGSE, 2019). Penn has provided us a list of terms and definitions to help guide our "Portrait of a Student." I have asked Ms. Kelley and Mr. Marshaleck to use this work as we develop our Comprehensive Plan.

As a result of our work on equity, my most recent Superintendents Retreat in Washington, DC, and the work we are doing with the Center for School Study Councils, it is very clear that we must remove barriers for our students and provide them with multiple pathways and opportunities to graduate from high school. We have to continue to refine our teaching methods to identify student strengths and interests. When I attend these learning opportunities, I take time to reflect on common themes and messages that come from each new experience. I look to see how I can apply what I have learned to help shape and improve the Upper Darby School District.

Superintendent's Corner

Over the last several months, the following common themes have emerged:

- Districts must focus on equity and inclusive practices,
- Districts must believe that every child has a strength and can contribute in a positive, productive way in society,
- Standardized test results do not determine the success of a student or school district,
- You can always improve communication of your plan, your goals and objectives, and
- We have to continue to better balance the time in our student day to teach prosocial skills and restorative justice in order to develop and promote happy and healthy students and staff.

As a District, we are working on each of these themes and attempting to improve. We have an Equity Plan, we value our students as more than a test score, and we continue to encourage and promote prosocial skills, restorative practices, and training on trauma informed care.

Communication, however, continues to be an area where we can improve. At the core of each new learning experience is the opportunity to continue to improve on how a plan, a goal, or an objective can be shared and embraced by a community through effective communication. To that end, I would like to design and implement a Community Advisory Committee (name subject to change) with representation from the following groups (other suggestions are certainly welcome):

- 1. School Board Representation
- 2. Superintendent of Schools, Assistant Superintendent(s), and CFO
- 3. School District Employee(s): Teacher, security, etc.
- 4. School District Administration: Principals, Directors, etc.
- 5. Township Administration
- 6. Township Council
- 7. Township Employee(s): Sanitation, Police, etc.
- 8. Community Representation (each district and/or school)

We want to galvanize the community to help provide solutions to the concerns we face and work toward common goals. The committee would act as a forum to provide insight from a cross section of community members. I would like to meet either monthly or bimonthly to review District Committee meeting topics, push communication out to community members who do not have children in the District, and establish community events and celebrations.

I've learned that some members of the community crave communication methods that are alternatives to email, social media, board and committee meetings and town hall meetings. At the moment, we are at odds with some members of the community over our plans to improve our facilities and the order of operations for the much needed improvements. Although our Communications have improved, we desire to do more. A committee such as the one I am describing will provide the further representation some community members feel is needed. As we move through the development and implementation of a new District Comprehensive Plan, I am requesting permission to establish a committee that works together to provide the best for this community. Improved communication is a key theme that has emerged from Board meetings such as the one this evening, the discussions during meetings at the University of Pennsylvania, and the recent Superintendents retreat in Washington, DC. As educators, we are life-long learners and the team I work with each day is committed to getting things right for the benefit of our students, their families, and the entire community. Board President Mitchell and members of the School Board, this concludes my report for the evening.
