

News from our Transportation Department

The mission of the Department of Transportation Services is to provide safe and reliable services to all eligible students in a fiscally responsible manner. A safe, reliable, efficient and on-time student transportation system depends on a strong partnership between parents, quardians, school administration, and the Department of Transportation Services.

Expectations of Parents and Guardians: Good student behavior while entering, riding, and leaving the bus contributes in many ways to safe transportation. Such conduct makes it possible for the driver to give full attention to the roadway and other drivers. Parents can also play an important role in creating a successful transportation experience by having their child arrive early to his/her assigned bus stop. When drivers have to honk and wait for students, it not only delays the pick-up times for all remaining students on the route, but can also result in late arrival to school, cutting into valuable teaching and learning time. Please ensure your child is at the bus stop in advance of his/her scheduled pick-up time. Please contact us if you have any transportation concerns at 610-352-7112.

Expectations of Transportation Staff: The driver of the bus has the responsibility and authority to maintain order and a safe environment. A bus driver who observes student misconduct or determines an unsafe condition exists has the authority to stop the bus and administer corrective action steps in order to ensure the safety of all passengers. The bus driver will document the misconduct on the Bus Conduct Incident Report form and submit the form to the Transportation and School Administration for review. The School Administration will investigate the incident and determine the corrective or disciplinary action based upon the severity of the action.

Expectations of Students: Students are to obey the following safety rules and regulations at the Bus Stop and while riding the Bus.

- Upon entering the bus, students will immediately find seats. They will remain in their seats. No one will be standing while the bus is moving.
- Students are not permitted to save seats for other students.
- · Students may be assigned seats by the Bus Attendant or Bus Driver.
- Each student shall display courteous conduct while entering the bus, on the bus, and departing the bus.
- Each student will get on and off at his/her assigned bus stop.
- Drinking of any liquid is prohibited on the bus.
 Students are not permitted to eat food or chew gum on the bus.
- Smoking is prohibited on the bus.
- Students may talk softly to each other while riding the bus; yelling and loud talking is not permitted.
- Profanity of any kind will not be tolerated on the bus.
- · Nothing shall be thrown or propelled on the bus, through the bus windows, or at the bus.
- · Fighting, scuffling, pushing or tripping is not permitted on the bus.
- There is no littering on the bus.
- · No student shall open the emergency door.
- Unreasonable conduct or unsafe actions will not be tolerated.
- · Students will be held responsible for any damages that they may do to any school bus.
- · Students are not to possess any type of weapon.
- · Students are not to possess, use or distribute any drugs or tobacco on the bus.

For those who may not know, Upper Darby School District has been partnering with the Youth Playwrights Program for over 20 years. For a full school year, a class of students from Drexel Hill and Beverly Hills participate in workshops at their schools with a professional playwright from the organization. These students are at the top level academically in their English classes and work closely with these literary professionals to improve their writing-based literacy skills and their 21st century skills like communication, collaboration, and creativity. These students go on to participate in a playwright competition with students across the area. Tamea and Amber, we congratulate you on this amazing accomplishment and would like to present you with a certificate of recognition from Upper Darby School District.

Happenings Across the District

Several families joined Dr. Ursone and his team at Beverly Hills Middle School for their Community Barbecue on Saturday, September 28th. From what I hear from Dr. Manfre, it was a good time for families to get together and to meet the BH staff and there were lots of family activities and great food. We look forward to this event again next school year.

The annual ELL Services Fair took place at Beverly Hills Middle School on Saturday, September 21st. Many County and Township Agencies were on hand to guide our immigrant families in how to access services that are available to them. In addition, free books were available to students and their families.

The UDSD Job Fair was held on September 19th in partnership with Substitute Teacher Services (STS). Administrators, union leaders, teachers and support staff represented the District. CareerLink out of Delaware County Community College also supported the event by providing employment resources. The job fair was a great opportunity to expose members of the community to a variety of available positions. More than 130 potential candidates attended this event.

Facilities Update

In line with our Comprehensive Facilities Improvement Plan, we are continuing in our efforts to improve schools across the District as still working on our plan to ease overcrowding in our elementary and middle schools. I would like to provide you an update on the status of our pool renovation. The major works have been completed, but a few cosmetics are still in progress. So far, we have replaced the pool roof, replastered the pool, power washed the benches, upgraded the electrical box, and repaired the showerheads and painted the benches in the locker room. We also replaced all water filters. We upgraded our water management system as well. This is an upgrade from manual to automatic. Custodians used to manually apply the chemical with jugs on a daily basis. One of the 2 new diving boards will arrive in late October. Since a new diving board costs about \$17,000, the second diving board will be purchased next year. We expect to have the new starting block with the UD Royals logo in early December and the new UD banner that will go over the entrance to the locker room will arrive by the end of this week. We have also removed the ADA pool lift and it is being replaced. The unit was broken and had not been moved for years since it was bulky and heavy. Finally, we will be purchasing new pool lanes and a pool vacuum and repairing the scoreboard.

Upper Darby High School Texting Threat

As you are aware, Upper Darby High School was in lockdown on Thursday, October 3rd. The lockdown was as a result of a student and staff doing the right thing and reporting something they saw in a text chain, feeling uncomfortable about it and reporting it to an adult. The police were notified, responded quickly and went to work vetting out the situation. We attempted to keep the Board, parents, staff and the media informed throughout the process through a series of communications through our robo-email system, ParentLink, and all of our social media platforms. The halls were silent and all of the doors were locked. After approximately 45 minutes, we were allowed to downgrade the lockdown to a shelter-in-place. The police reported to us that the lockdown went very well. Upper Darby Police were able to identify the students involved in our District in that they forwarded the message. Following the lockdown and subsequent shelter-in-place on October 3rd, there were several copycat posts and electronic communications throughout social media in the afternoon and throughout that evening. We contacted the police who immediately began to investigate. After speaking with the persons involved, Upper Darby Police determined that there was no real active threat against our schools and Upper Darby High School opened on a normal schedule. We consider it a very beneficial practice to review with all UDHS students, given today's social media culture, the pitfalls of such behaviors so as to prevent and to deter students from engaging in behaviors they might not otherwise consider to be a safety concern. We know that some students might engage in posting such content or in spreading such content because they are not aware that this behavior can have serious implications. All of such threats will be investigated. We will always choose to act out of an abundance of caution. Students need to know that that they DO leave digital footprints that can be tracked, and they can be criminally accountable for their behavior by law enforcement and the school district. To that end, Principal Simone and her team, Dr. Manfre (the Director of Secondary Schools) and I will review such incidents with students during PBIS lessons.

We are thankful to the thousands of students who do the right thing in our schools every day and to the parents who continue to monitor students' online and texting activity. We also thank the Upper Darby High School Principal and her team, the UDHS teachers and staff and the students for their cooperation while we were working through the incident. The Upper Darby Police Department worked very closely with our team during the lockdown, shelter-in-place and subsequent investigations well into the evening and even over the weekend. I very much appreciate the support of our local police.

Superintendent's Corner

As an administration, we will continue to work on our communication and how we handle incidents moving forward. It do want to take a moment and be very clear that students who are caught causing or perpetuating threats against our school will be disciplined. While we have a restorative approach to our disciplinary practices, we will not tolerate threatening acts or acts of violence against our staff or other students. We have to work together to improve our image, and we have to work together to end such behavior. As a community, we are better than this.

Safety Improvement Update

On Monday, October 7th, we provided an update to all District Stakeholders on the District's ongoing work to ensure that student safety is its priority. In that update, we shared that the District wrote a grant for over \$2.2 million for improved school safety and security in our elementary, middle and high schools.

Through Pennsylvania's Safe Schools Grant, all schools will receive additional building security systems. Safe schools improvements at Upper Darby High School include retrofitting of its main entrance for installation of airlock sensors that electronically interlock the doors. This prevents direct entry into the building without a visitor accessing a check-in kiosk where the Raptor visitor management system is employed for photo identity checks.

Will would like to install a one-button lock system at the middle and high schools which are designed to lock down the buildings more expeditiously in the case of an emergency. In addition, we would like a swipe card system will be installed at all three secondary schools for employee entry and exit. This summer, a core group of educators from each school received the start of training in Restorative Practices from Safer Saner Schools, a whole-school program that supports the improvement of school climate and culture by decreasing unsafe behavior and increasing prosocial interaction. All schools will receive surveillance cameras and DVRs to record surveillance camera data. The CrisisGo safety mobile app will be used Districtwide to communicate emergency management information to parents, staff and stakeholders. Each school will receive CCTV video security monitors, exterior cameras and interior surveillance cameras. Included in the costs are camera installation for 188 exterior cameras and 188 exterior cameras in the 14 schools and licensing for the alarm sensors, 1-button lock and swipe card systems in the secondary schools.

We continue to take proactive steps in our approach to safety and security. These improvements accompany existing school safety systems and improvements which include the addition of exterior cameras in all elementary schools, the installation of the Raptor system in all schools to track check-in and check-out times for visitors and volunteers across the District, Stop the Bleed training and kits received through the District Attorney's office, security guards at every school, the District's award-winning Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program, Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS), the addition of Elementary School Counselors and its Supportive Relationships Program.

The District expects to receive the Safe Schools awards letter within weeks. Our contractors and the bids are ready to go upon receipt of the funding.

The District will apply for the 2019-20 \$450,000 competitive Safe Schools grant for use from March 2020 through March 2022. The District will also apply for a \$45,000 meritorious safety grant for July 1 through June 30 for the 2019-20 school year.

The safety of our students, staff and visitors to our buildings is our number one priority. We are excited to have been awarded the Safe Schools grant and look forward to continuing in our work of improving school safety and the environments in which our students learn. Board President Mitchell and members of the School Board, this concludes my report for the evening.
