### Message from our Assistant Principal Mr. Walden

It's hard to believe we're already heading into April, but here we are — and we've got a lot of great things happening at school!

### **PBIS Update:**

In March, our PBIS focus was all about <u>Cooperation</u>. We loved seeing students working together, showing kindness, and building each other up both in and out of the classroom. ## FABULOUS FOURTH GRADERS

Fourth grade has started and completed our first Social Studies unit. Students spent time learning about the five regions of the United States. The states in each region share characteristics like geography or climate that help group them together. Significant time was spent practicing map skills during this unit. Students learned how to use longitude and latitude lines to locate exact locations on a map. Map keys and map scales were used to help identify symbols and measure distances. Students also used cardinal (North, South, East and West) and intermediate directions (Northeast, Northwest, Southeast, and Southwest) to determine where locations were in relation to one another.

Math finds students applying their knowledge of fractions to understand decimals. Students practiced writing numbers as both a fraction and a decimal. Equivalent fractions also helped students comprehend decimal equivalency. Students are moving into their study of Geometry. They are starting the unit by identifying lines, line segments, rays and angles. Soon they will move to measuring angles and solving to find the missing measurement of connected angles.

In ELA, students have started our eighth module "Food for Thought." This module finds students mostly focusing on nonfiction. Students will read pieces that help students identify the main idea, supporting details, author's purpose, as well as text and graphic features. Students are also spending time doing research this marking period. Students are taught to paraphrase information and not plagiarize from sources. Students will use the research to write an expository essay on their assigned topic.

## SUPER SECOND GRADERS

It has been a busy month in Second Grade! The last several weeks brought with it several new spelling patterns with long vowels such as ai and ay for long a, oa and ow for long o and igh and ie for long i. We have worked in reading to improve our fluency and understanding of stories through discussions of point of view and the elements of poetry as we explored the artistic world of poems and their meanings. In math we have learned 3 digit addition and subtraction, using our base ten blocks and number lines to practice. In science we learned about erosion and saving the land from different types of weathering. Students worked together in Science to build and test models of levees, seawalls, and/or breakwaters. Students are enjoying many more outdoor recess days! We look forward to a fun-filled final two months of 2nd grade!



Our first graders have been busy bees this month! We've been building our reading skills by reading fluently, exploring measurement in math, and learning all about shadows in science. The students especially enjoyed our safety lesson with Delaware County Victim Assistance. We're so proud of all the growth we're seeing in our first grade learners!
