
# UPPER DARBY SCHOOL DISTRICT





#### Staffing areas in which districts are experiencing a shortage





Figure 3: Comparison of Number of Newly Certified Teachers to Number of Teaching Positions Filled by Individuals on an Emergency Permit



Figure 14: Number of TPP Enrollees by Race/Ethnicity for Students of Color (2009-2020)






## Dealing with the pandemic has been hard on school leaders and staff
