District educators along with environmentalists from Riverbend Environmental Education Center and Aqua Pennsylvania teamed to provide students with details about where the water out of their taps comes from.

The program expands on an eight-year partnership with Riverbend of enhancing students' understanding of the natural world.

Students used an interactive map to trace the path of water flowing to their homes from the water sources in their community.
